Insights from the Lutherans For Life of Michigan Display at the All Pastors Conference

Pastor Paul Clark, my wife Jo Anne, and I, had the privilege of having the *Lutherans For Life of Michigan* display table at the LCMS Michigan District All Pastors conference on October 11 and 12. It has been nearly two years since we last had a display at a pastors' conference because conferences were either canceled or were virtual because of COVID-19 restrictions.

It seemed as though more pastors, pastors' wives, and others stopped by our table at this conference than at past conferences. As I spoke with people, I brought up two issues: the importance of the upcoming midterm elections and sexual relations outside of marriage that lead to unwanted pregnancies and abortions.

Almost everyone that I spoke with acknowledged the importance of the 2022 elections. If Roe vs Wade is overturned, each state will make and enforce laws about abortion. Michigan has a law that would go into effect that makes all abortion illegal, except to save the life of the mother. However, there are those currently in power in our state government that would like to eliminate that law, keeping abortion legal in Michigan, even if Roe is struck down. So, it is very important that we retain a pro-life majority in the Michigan House and Senate.

Midterm elections for the US House and Senate are also extremely important for life issues. There are those in current positions of leadership that would like to enact legislation that would continue to make abortion legal nation-wide if Roe is struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court. We need to elect more pro-life people as representatives and senators to prevent that from occurring. Most of the people I spoke with agreed. I encouraged them to take some copies of the LFL brochure by Pastor Michael Salemink, "Is Abortion an Election Issue?" If you would like some copies of it, please email me at lflmi.treasurer@gmail.com. I encourage all Christians to talk about this with family members that are eligible to vote, fellow members of your congregation, neighbors, co-workers, etc.

One person said even if abortion is illegal, women will still have abortions. This, of course, is true and it is a common statement for keeping abortion legal, but is it helpful? It is true that we break God's laws and man's laws all the time. So, should God not have given His law because He knew that we would not obey it? One purpose of the law is to show us our sin so that we will see our need for repentance and forgiveness, our need for the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. While abortion is legal according to man's law, it leads people to believe that it is not wrong to have an abortion or to perform an abortion. This prevents them from seeing that they have sinned against God's law, "You shall not murder." They do not see a need for repentance and forgiveness and they are prevented from receiving the forgiveness that Jesus has accomplished for them.

I have recently been thinking that while our efforts to educate Lutherans and others that abortion is sinful and should not be legal are good, maybe it would be more effective to concentrate more on the sins that lead women to seek an abortion. That is, sexual relations outside of marriage, either between those that are not married or a married person having a relationship with someone other than their spouse. The statistics indicate that 85% of women that have abortions conceived outside of marriage. (continued on p.5)

Another statistic indicates that many women that have had an abortion attend a church. So, if we would spend more time educating people, beginning with our church members, about the beauty of sexual relations within the confines of marriage as God designed marriage and the physical, emotional, and spiritual problems caused by sex outside of marriage, then we would be approaching the root cause of the problem. Our society is bombarding us with the idea that sexual relations anytime, anywhere, between any two (or more) individuals are perfectly normal and good for those involved. Parents, grandparents, and even some pastors are unwilling or afraid to say anything when they are aware or suspect that their children, grandchildren, or members of the congregations are engaging in such activities. Does God not say that we are to be teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom? (*Colossians 3:16*) I must also say that I have sinned in these areas in many times and ways, in thought, word, and deed. The Holy Spirit has led me to see my sins and repent. I have the assurance that I have received forgiveness through the suffering, death, and resurrection of my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Concordia Publishing House had their usual display area selling books and other items at the conference. I bought two copies of *Sexuality Mentality – Creating a Culture of Biblical Integrity* by Heather Ruesch (Concordia Publishing House, Copyright 2018).

When I got home and began reading the book, I found that Heather is saying what I am thinking in a much more professional and profound way, also with much more credibility. She quotes several Bible passages and speaks of her own experience to encourage each of us to re-evaluate what it means to be a baptized child of God. I encourage everyone to order copies of Heather's book for yourselves and to give to others. Let's begin to approach the life issue at the beginning before the sins occur that lead to someone seeking an abortion.

Lutherans For Life of Michigan 2022 Essay Contest

Sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents, Lutherans For Life

For students in Grades 6 through 12

attending a Lutheran School or Lutheran Church

Contest Guidelines

Students will write a life-affirming essay based on the theme: **Blessed For Life** with the Bible verse: "... the Lord protects him and keeps him alive; he is called blessed in the land; you do not give him up to the will of his enemies." Psalm 41:2. (Consider being blessed with the gift of life, blessed by God for one's entire life or blessed to be a blessing to others.)

Lutheran churches and schools may each submit one entry in each grade level category (Grades 6-8, Grades 9-12) to Lutherans For Life of Michigan. The winning entry at the state level will then be submitted to the national Lutherans For Life Contest.

- 1. Not incorporating the conference verse in the essay will disqualify the entry.
- 2. Examples of topics the essay could deal with are, but not limited to: abortion, people with disabilities, adoption or foster care, infanticide, cloning, stem cell research, physician assisted suicide or euthanasia, etc.
- 3. Essays should include student's name, grade (Identify school or church) and email address. All entries submitted by a teacher or pastor should include their name and email address. This information should be submitted on the rubric page used in grading the essay.
- 4. All sources for references, statistics, and quotes should be incorporated within the essay and then included in a bibliography at the end.

Grades 6 - 8 should submit essays up to 400 words

Grades 9 - 12 should submit essays up to 750 words

Entries should be submitted digitally using Microsoft Word via email to schaidtl@gmail.com by February 28, 2022.

- 5. The First Place winner in each category (Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12) will receive a \$100 prize and advance to the national contest. The Second Place winner in each category at the state level will receive a \$75 prize.
- 6. Grand Prize for the national winning entry at each level: \$250 plus free conference registration to a 2022 Regional Conference and one night stay at the conference hotel. Second Place for the national contest will receive a prize of \$125.
- 7. All entries become the property of Lutherans For Life.



Pumpkins for a Purpose: Turning Fall Fun into Support for Life

In the spring, some students at Concordia University, Ann Arbor, approached Dr. Charles Schulz of the theology department about starting a Life Team on campus. Since it was already late in the semester, they decided to wait until the fall to see what they could organize. As the new school year began, hosting a table on central campus found that a number of other students were eager to support the pro-life cause. The group settled on the name "Cards4Life" to connect it to the Y4Life movement among the other Concordia schools. They also decided to debut their organization with a pumpkin carving contest to raise funds for a worthy cause. God blessed their creativity with good success and good connections with the campus.

As they moved toward organizing the event, they found that the student services staff had already planned a pumpkin carving contest. However, they welcomed the student initiative and were glad to have Cards4Life take over the activity. Student Services then provided all the pumpkin carving tools and the reserved space on campus, as well as help with coordinating the logistics of storing and displaying the pumpkins. One of the Cards4Life students who commutes to campus from rural Michigan also asked local farmers for donations of pumpkins. Hearing of the cause, they were glad to contribute and thirty pumpkins were soon tucked away for the event.

Tuesday, Oct. 5, students were invited to carve pumpkins for free. They also selected among a number of prolife causes to associate with their work—St. Jude's research for sick children, Family of God among the homeless in Detroit, Hope Clinic in Ypsilanti, Family Life Services in Ypsilanti, and Ronald McDonald House. From Wednesday through Friday, faculty, students, and staff on campus were then invited to vote for their favorite pumpkin, at a cost of \$.50 per vote. The pumpkin and the cause with the greatest votes would take the total of the contributions. A student with a Venmo account for her personal business also accepted electronic donations for the activity to facilitate the giving.

In the end, \$382.50 was raised. Winning carvers, Ellie Fritcha and Luke Neuhaus, were celebrated at the break between the first two quarters of the Homecoming game on Saturday. The winning charity was Family Life Services of Ypsilanti, Michigan, a pro-life pregnancy counseling and resource center for needy women and their families. With such a great beginning, Cards4Life is looking forward to the next work God will do through them for life.


