Hidden in Disability

When my sister was born at 23 weeks, the doctor did not want to resuscitate her, knowing she would have many disabilities in the unlikely event she survived. Disability can be a darkness for us but through God' grace, light shines in the darkness. All Babies Are a Blessing

In Genesis we read that God "breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature" (Genesis 2:7). All life comes from God. "In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:4-5). All life is a gift from God, but people in this world are constantly taking away that amazing gift that God so generously gave us. No one has the authority to do this; God gave this life to us, and it is not meant to be taken away. Abortion must be stopped.

You may have heard people say, "A child in the womb is just a clump of cells." They claim that they can kill babies because they are "just cells." This makes absolutely no sense however, because cells, by definition, are "capable...of performing all the fundamental functions of life" (Merriam Webster's Dictionary 184). Clearly these so called "clumps of cells" are living beings. As Heartbeat Pregnancy Center says, "A baby's heartbeat begins to beat on day 21 after conception" (Heartbeat Pregnancy Center). And yet, there are still many people out there in this broken world who are murdering these helpless babies.

How is abortion any different from murdering a grown person? It isn't. They are both living, they are both human. As Choices Pregnancy center says, "an unborn baby is human" (Choices Pregnancy Center). Most importantly, they are both blessings from God: "Behold, children are a heritage from the Lord, the fruit of the womb a reward" (Psalm 127:3). Sadly this is a sinful world and people find excuses to murder their babies, like fear that the baby will be too much work, cost too much money, have cancer or any other medical condition, or even live a life of suffering. Luckily there are pregnancy centers that are supporting women and supplying them with everything that they might need to care for a baby. "This dark world is

not all darkness." Even though many babies are being murdered every day, there are still amazing people out there who are doing all they can to save these poor, helpless babies. For example, this past November, we held our first ever Michigan March for Life. Many churches, (including my own) donate money and goods to pregnancy centers, to help women who don't know what to do.

This dark world is not all darkness. Life shines in darkness. Nothing in this world could ever change that.

President's Column by Pastor Paul Clark, President of Lutherans For Life of Michigan

During my six years of working as a medical orderly at *Seaway Hospital* in Trenton, there were several quite memorable occurrences. Most of these took place in the Emergency Room, which is where I was usually assigned. But at times I worked in one of the medical or surgical wings of the hospital. While working on the floor known as Surgical East, there was a patient by the name of *Richard*. I was often called to assist the nurses and aides in caring for him. Richard had been in a terrible motorcycle accident and had sustained serious head injuries. After emergency surgery, he had fallen into a coma. For over two months, Richard lay there, in that same bed, in that same hospital room, unresponsive, fed through a tube, and being turned from side to side every few hours to prevent bedsores. No one thought Richard had any chance of recovery. Sadly, the terrible and degrading word "*vegetable*" was used by some who cared for him. I confess, to my shame, that it may have been used by me.

Then, one day, Richard came out of the coma. He simply woke up.

In the days and weeks that followed, many were startled to hear that he had heard and even remembered some of the things that were said by the people who cared for him or visited him. I wish I could say that during that period I had prayed by his bedside or read Holy Scripture to him, but at that point in my life, sad to say, I was not very mature at all in the faith, and like many of my companions, had written him off as a lost cause. I shudder when pondering what he might have overheard.

As I said, I am ashamed of my attitude at that time. But then again, looking back, I am ashamed of many things. I venture to say that I am not alone. You've no doubt spent time in that Hall of Shame and that Garden of Guilt also. Our lives are often haunted by guilt and shame. The poet **Henry Wadsworth Longfellow** wrote,

Each heart has its haunted chamber,

Where the silent moonlight falls!

On the floor are mysterious footsteps,

There are whispers along the walls!

And mine at times is haunted

By Phantoms of the Past

As motionless as shadows

By the silent moonlight cast.

The Past, with its beastly burden of guilt and shame, can leave emotional scars upon us. Longfellow was right: *Every heart does have its haunted chamber*. But remember, a *scar* is a wound that is *healed and covered with new skin*. Thanks be to God for His unfathomable love in sending us His beloved Son, Jesus, who by His suffering, death, and resurrection removed the burden of sin and guilt, and yes, even shame, and in their place gives us forgiveness and peace. We pray with the psalmist, *"Create in me a clean heart, O God,"* and He does. *In Christ*, through *Holy Baptism*, we are made *new*.

Human life is a precious and beautiful gift. Every life has infinite value to the One whose flesh was pierced and whose body was nailed to that bloody cross. Jesus died for all. As we recently did in **Holy Week**, we now continue to come to the Lord's House and hear once more the emotionally overwhelming account of our Lord's Passion, of His intense suffering, both physical and spiritual, for us sinners. Dear Christian, your Savior's blood wipes away every taint, every trace, of your sin. That blood quenches the damning fire of your guilt and shame. These plunge into the waters of your baptism and rise no more. No matter what you have done, or what past sins haunt you, there is and remains forgiveness in Jesus. This is the One who was stricken, smitten, and afflicted - for you. Here in God's Church, we "come to Calvary's holy mountain," where we find "a pure and healing fountain" that "flows for you, for me, for all" (LSB #435). Here you freely receive the gifts of God given to you in the Divine Service. Here are WORDS that have the power to absolve. Here is WATER connected with God's Word and promise that now washes away the grime of guilt and sin and brings regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit. Here are BREAD AND WINE, that hand over to you the very BODY AND BLOOD of Him, who on the Tree of the Cross, cried out, "IT IS FINISHED!"

Here, as we gather together in the *Divine Service*, is the risen and victorious Lord Jesus, who conquered death and hell, and brings life and immortality to light. Once again – *ALL FOR YOU!*

Every life has tremendous value. Your life, my life, and yes, Richard's life – there are no human vegetables. There are only human beings, created in the image of God, created male and female, valued enough that God sent His only-begotten Son to die for us, **for God desires all to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth.**

Richard – whether in a coma or not – was valued by God. Jesus gave His life for Richard. Our humanity is not determined by how healthy we are, how strong we are, or how much we do. It is not determined by how others see us or by what value society places on our lives.

But here is the *bad news*. Here in the *State of Michigan* a four-bill package has already been introduced in our State Senate designed to legalize physician-assisted suicide. *Dear saints, we must stand against this!* Our lives and times are in God's hands, not doctors, nor medical panels, nor government officials. Both physician-assisted suicide and euthanasia weaken the entire medical profession, undermining the commitment by doctors and medical professionals to care and save lives, instead of ending them. It gives too much power to doctors, government, insurance companies, and the like. Many patients, who already may suffer from depression, will feel abandoned or even pressured by society, or even by their own family, to end their lives. The grisly beat of the pro-death drum continues, but the march toward the so-called *"right to die"* only brings more suffering and emotional anguish and furthers the devil's mission to deceive people into embracing the culture of death. We need to be prepared to resist this legislation in Michigan and remain at our post in being a strong and reliable voice for life.

We have so much more to offer than "solutions" such as physician-assisted suicide and euthanasia. We support efforts that are designed to heal, not kill, such as hospice care, counseling, medications that can ease pain, and emotional support. No matter how many days we may have on this earth, or how badly our health fails, we are loved and valued by God. In Jesus, we have an inheritance that is kept for you in heaven, unfading, unspoiled. Instead of offering death as an answer to pain, suffering, and emotional anguish, we offer compassion. We have the **Gospel**, which alone brings peace and help to all who call upon the Lord in faith.

Thus, the drumbeat to which we march is the cadence that God provides us in His holy Word. Jesus - who died for you, for me, and for all - has crushed the head of the serpent and demolished the stranglehold of death. *Grounded in the Resurrection of Jesus*, we behold *our resurrection* as well. Hope springs anew, and the life we have now expands into eternity. *No devil* can touch that. The bottom line is this: *Jesus lives, and in Him, we will live also.*

Praise be to Jesus, who suffered, was crucified, died, and rose again; who is truly the LORD OF LIFE!

A Life Summit: Life Triumphant Hurled in Splendor Through Thy Broken World

Presented by Lutherans For Life of Michigan

More than 100 people from across Michigan gathered at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Fowler on April 28th to listen, discuss, and encourage each other in our work For Life. Michigan is becoming an increasingly challenging state in which to advocate for the value of every human life from fertilization to forever. Even still life shines through the darkness and that message of the value of every human life must continue to be shared. So we gather and learn and share ideas and celebrate God's gift of life together.

The event began by joining together in the hymn "O God, O Lord of Heaven and Earth" by Martin Franzmann (Lutheran Service Book #834), wherein we find the title of the event: "life triumphant hurled in splendor through Thy broken world." It is a broken world indeed. Yet the Lord of Life Himself brought life to this broken world by His own life incarnate, His death for our life, and His triumphant resurrection to bring the sure hope of ours. After the hymn, Pastor Paul Clark presented on this theme. He serves as Pastor at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Fowler, President of Lutherans For Life of Michigan, Life Coordinator for the Michigan District of the LC-MS, and serves on the LFL National Board of Directors. He spoke on the connection of the hymn text to our work advocating for the protection of human life. While we mourn over the brokenness of this world and the increasing culture of death that surrounds us, we do not mourn as those who have no hope (see 1 Thessalonians 4:13). Rather, we press on, knowing that life is indeed triumphant because the Lord of Life has already triumphed over death. To those in despair, in darkness, in the depths of the culture of death, we strive to bring this hope, a hope that enlivens, protects life, and rejoices in the life to come.

Next, we heard two presentations by Dr. Roni Grad. He is a retired pediatric pulmonologist, Chair of his congregation's Life Team in Arizona, Secretary of the LFL National Board of Directors, and the Life Coordinator for the English District of the LC-MS. In his first presentation, Intricately Woven, he discussed how we see the hand of God at work throughout pre-natal development. His second presentation, Organ Donation and Determination of Death, covered the biblical definition of death contrasted with recent changes in the accepted medical definition and how that impacts the decision-making process about organ donation. 

Valuing Life: A Personal Reflection

As I sit here writing this article, I am eagerly (and admittedly, impatiently) awaiting the birth of our third child. The months, weeks, days, and hours that have passed since we found out we were expecting have given me ample time to reflect on the gift of life and the tremendous joy that comes with a new baby. This time has also led me to reflect on the sad state of our society, which continues to devalue that very gift of life and celebrate its destruction.

I know first-hand that pregnancy does not come easily for some couples. We went through several years of waiting, praying, and some basic infertility treatments before being blessed with our firstborn, a daughter. We went through several more years of waiting, praying, failed infertility treatments, and a year-long adoption process before being blessed with our son through adoption. We were so thankful that God had given us two children, and we felt that our family was likely complete. In addition to the gratefulness we had for our two kids, the astronomical cost and the stress of both infertility and adoption had led us to close the doors on pursuing either of those routes again.

Needless to say, we were beyond thrilled last June to find out that God had blessed us with a third child. The shock, joy, disbelief, and excitement created a surge of emotions that I'll never forget. Ten years ago, we weren't sure if we would be able to have any kids at all, and now here we are - days away from meeting our third little one!

I share all of this because I understand that our path was different than the "average" couple's. I am confident that the long, bumpy road we traveled to become parents has made us all the more grateful for the kids God has placed in our care. I believe that people tend to appreciate something more when they have to work harder or wait longer to get it, and I'm sure that plays a part in my passion for life ministry and my desire for all people to see the value of every life, especially the unborn. But I also believe that the road a couple (or an individual) travels does not excuse them from seeing the value of every life. Whether pregnancy came easily or not, whether a pregnancy was planned or not, whether it's an "ideal" time to have a baby, whether the parents are financially stable, whether there's a chance the baby may have a medical condition, or whatever other various scenarios you can think of, that baby is a precious life, created by God. God already has a purpose and a plan for that precious life, and no circumstance of the parents or anyone else merits the destruction of that life. Take a look at a couple of truths found in Scripture that support this claim:

- Psalm 139:13 "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb." This verse emphasizes the fact that God created us *in the womb*. This is important because it confirms that we did not come to be by chance or by accident; rather, we were *created* by God. This fact alone means that our life has had meaning and purpose from the time we were in our mother's womb.
- Exodus 20:13 "You shall not murder." When God gave the Ten Commandments, He was straightforward and direct. These clearly stated laws were guidelines for the Israelites long ago and for us today. The Sixth Commandment does not include a list of exceptions...it doesn't say "You shall not murder unless the victim is younger than ____ or older than ____," or "You shall not murder unless the victim has a disability," or "You shall not murder unless this is an inconvenient time to have a child." Rather, it simply and directly states, "You shall not murder." It leaves no room for interpretation. Thinking back to the

previous truth that God created us *in the womb*, this commandment certainly applies even to those little lives at their earliest stages.

• Matthew 22:39 - "Love your neighbor as yourself." In this verse, Jesus is stating that the idea of *loving one's neighbor* is the second greatest command, behind only *loving the Lord your God*. It is understood throughout Scripture that the idea of *neighbor* refers to all human beings. We have already established that God creates life in the womb, so this term *neighbor* certainly extends to those lives in the womb. Can you think of a more vulnerable, helpless, at-risk group of *neighbors* than the unborn? They certainly need our love, protection, and willingness to stand up and defend their right to life.

The fact that there are people in our world, our country, our state, and maybe even our own circles of friends and family who refuse to acknowledge these Scriptural truths is heartbreaking. People are literally fighting for the "right" to murder, and celebrating when that "right" is granted. What an absolute slap in the face to anyone who has ever longed for a child, lost a child, struggled with infertility, or had a miscarriage. More so, what a slap in the face to God, our Creator, and the truths that He set forth for us in His Word.

You don't need to have personal experience with pregnancy, infertility, or parenthood to recognize the horror of abortion and to feel heartbroken over the millions of lives lost to and affected by abortion. As Christians, as those who believe in the truths of Scripture, and as humans who respect and desire to protect every life, we need to continue to pray, share, and spread information to help end the atrocity of abortion.
