#### God help us! Amen!



# 2021 Essay Contest

#### For students in Grades 6 through 12

#### **Contest Guidelines**

Students will write a life-affirming essay based on the 2021 Conference theme and Conference bible verse: **GOD CHOSE YOU** based on John 15:16, which *reads "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit."* 

Lutheran churches and schools may *each submit one entry in each grade level category (Grades 6-8, Grades 9-12) to Lutherans For Life of Michigan*. The winning entry at the state level will then be submitted to the national Lutherans For Life Contest.

- 1. Not incorporating the conference verse in the essay will disqualify the entry.
- 2. Examples of topics the essay could deal with are, but not limited to: abortion, people with disabilities, adoption or foster care, infanticide, cloning, stem cell research, physician assisted suicide or euthanasia, etc.
- 3. Essays should include student's name, grade (Identify school or church) and email address. All entries submitted by a teacher or pastor should include their name and email address. This information should be submitted on the rubric page used in grading the essay.
- 4. All sources for references, statistics, and quotes should be incorporated within the essay and then included in a bibliography at the end.

Grades 6 - 8 should submit essays up to 400 words Grades 9 - 12 should submit essays up to 750 words

Entries should be submitted digitally using *Microsoft Word* via email to **schaidtl@gmail.com** by **February 28, 2021**.

- 5. The First Place winner in each category (Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12) will receive a \$100 prize and advance to the national contest. The Second Place winner in each category at the state level will receive a \$75 prize.
- Grand Prize for the national winning entry at each level: \$250 plus free conference registration to a 2021 Regional Conference and one night stay at the conference hotel. Second Place for the national contest will receive a prize of \$125.
- 7. All entries become the property of Lutherans For Life.

#### Keynote Speaker: Rev. Jeffrey W. Duncan, Director of Mission and Ministry for Lutherans

Rev. Jeffrey W. Duncan joined the LFL staff with an active duty call to serve as Mission and Ministry Director in January 2020. In this capacity he actively encourages and equips Gospel Motivated Voices for Life in LFL Chapters, Life Teams, and State Federations across the U.S. Appointed to the National Board of Directors in 2017, he has over 30-years of volunteer activity in LFL chapters, his parishes, and as District Life Coordinator of the KS District LCMS. Pastor Duncan received his Master of Divinity from <u>Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, MO</u> in June 2001 and served parishes in Sullivan, MO and Wichita, KS.
